One style of proceeding

- 1. Core repertoire book (usually classical)
- 2. Sheet music or second repertoire book
- 3. Fun book can be jazz, church music, educational composer, musical theatre score. The focus can change from year to year
- 4. Sight reading book, sight reading plan, or reading pieces
- 5. Additional areas (technique, theory, composition, keyboard theory, music history/listening, ear training, ensemble music) you determine Rule of thumb a total of 6 books
