

Greetings

It is my great pleasure to welcome you to the 2001 National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy. The Conference Planning Committee has worked long and hard to prepare for this auspicious occasion and we are delighted you are here. Perhaps never before in the history of piano pedagogy has there been such an illustrious gathering of pedagogical greats—artists, teachers, pedagogues, and music educators. The pages of this Conference Program booklet read like a "Who's Who" of leaders in our field.

The 2001 Conference reactivates the original National Conference on Piano Pedagogy, inaugurated by Richard Chronister and James Lyke, which last met in 1994. The sponsoring organization for the new Conference is The Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy, founded in 1999, with Richard Chronister as President and Louise Goss as Chair of the Board.

It had been Richard's dream that the first priority of the Center would be to reactivate the Pedagogy Conference. A conference was scheduled for August 2000, but Richard's untimely death necessitated postponing those plans. The Board decided that, despite Richard's death, the Conference must continue. We are extremely gratified that today our decision becomes a reality.



Richard Chronister

Frances Clark's life and career dominated the entire field of piano pedagogy during the last half of the twentieth century. When she died in 1998, Richard Chronister, Louise Goss, and a group of their close friends,

all of them former students and close colleagues of Frances Clark, set out to form a pedagogy center that would not only keep alive her legacy, but insure that it would change and grow in ways consistent with her educational philosophy. The Center's origins and current activities are described on page 36.

As we launch this revival of the Pedagogy Conference, we think with gratitude and love of all that Frances and Richard have meant to us and to the whole world of music making at the piano. I'm sure they are sharing our joy and excitement as the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy returns.

Frances Clark

Frances Clark

Frances Clark's life and career dominated the entire field of piano pedagogy in the last half of the twentieth century. The philosophy of teaching that formed the basis of the piano pedagogy programs she initiated at Kalamazoo College (MI) and later transplanted to Westminster Choir College and The New School for Music Study (Princeton, NJ), is the result of her distinguished lifetime career as a pioneering music educator and piano pedagogue.

It is this philosophy that directs the work of the Frances Clark Center. The Board of Trustees includes people who have worked closely with her through the years, as well as other prominent teachers, pianists, and researchers. It is the purpose of the Center to insure the ongoing influence of her philosophy, as well as to develop, test and disseminate new applications through its research, seminars, workshops, and conferences.

Work of the Center

The Center's current projects include:

- The New School for Music Study, a community music school and teacher training center in Princeton, NJ, founded in 1960 by Frances Clark and Louise Goss.
- Keyboard Companion magazine, a quarterly periodical for teachers of beginners through late intermediate piano students, founded in 1990 by Richard Chronister, now owned and published by The Frances Clark Center.




