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Biographical

- Dates: 1915 1988
- Born in Baltimore, Maryland
- Attended Frederic Douglass High School, where he studied with W.
 Llewellyn Wilson, a Baltimore-born African American conductor, musician, and music educator.
- Denied entrance to Peabody Conservatory because Black students were not allowed to attend.
- Attended Howard University briefly, then Eastman School of Music.
- At Eastman he studied piano with Cécile Genhart.
- Earned three degrees BM in piano, theory, and MM in theory, and graduated with honors.
- First position was Instructor of Piano and Organ at Knoxville College in Tennessee (HBCU).
- Taught at Howard University (HCBU) as Professor of Piano and Chair of the Piano Department from 1943-1976.
- Served as the organist at Plymouth Congregational Church in Washington, D.C. for 35 years.
- As pianist, performed widely in the Baltimore and Washington, DC area, and on the Black College Circuit.
- Two children, Judith, and Thomas III, from first marriage with Norma McAlister Kerr.
- 2nd marriage to Hortense Reid Kerr, professor of piano at Howard University.

Compositional Style and Output

- Composed for necessity and for special occasions.
- The catalogue lists over 150 works for piano, organ, voice, chorus, and chamber ensembles.
- No publications during his lifetime.
- Publications (prior to 2024): Six organ works and four art songs.
- Composition style merges European art music forms with African and African American musical elements and traditions. He was especially influenced by the African American Spiritual.
- Describes his musical style as "conservative," rejecting serialism and atonality.
- Wanted to compose music that would "speak directly to the hearts of the listeners."

Didn't My Lord Deliver Daniel?: Concert Scherzo for Two Pianos

- Composed in 1940
- Needed a piece to perform with his duo-piano partner, <u>Sylvia Olden Lee</u>, on the "Black College Circuit."
- Based on the African American Spiritual "Didn't My Lord Deliver Daniel?
- Formal Design: Loose theme and variation structure
 - o Kerr's treatment of variation form enhances the narrative effect of the work by writing variations of differing lengths thus obscuring the more common sectional structure of variation form.
 - o Hortense Reid Kerr writes, "And so, in this version of that form, he has tried to abbreviate some variations and elongate others, while at the same time altering the style and character of each."
- Advanced harmonic language. Tonal, but utilizing many extended harmonies; jazz, gospel, and blues influences.
- Performance History
 - o Performed by Kerr/Lee duo over 20 times on the Black College Circuit
 - Performed by Delphin and Romain Piano Duo in several high-profile concerts during the 1980s including the Kennedy Center, the White House, and Carnegie Hall
 - o Performed by Hortense Reid Kerr / Constance Tibbs Hobson throughout the 1980s
 - o Performed by the Nyaho/Garcia Piano Duo in several performances, 2021-2023
 - o Recorded by the Nyaho/Garcia Piano Duo in 2022
