## **Technique Check-up**

Balancing Act



**Tool kit:** Hi-liter pens, colored pencils, or removable highlighter tape.

**Instructions:** Do you find it tricky to play the melody louder than the accompaniment? Try the **Balancing Act** project.

1. Pat your head with your right hand. At the same time, rub your stomach with your left hand. Change to your left hand patting your head, and your right hand rubbing your stomach. This exercise helps rev up your brain by doing something different on each side of your body at the same time.



3. Practice a pentascale with relaxed arm weight and firm

fingertips sinking into the keys for the loud hand. At the same time, practice lightly brushing the surfaces of the keys (without making any sound) for the quiet hand. Repeat until easy, then switch hands.

4. Practice playing *forte* (firm fingertips and relaxed arm weight) with the right hand and left hand, *piano* (gentle brush stroke). Repeat until easy, then switch hands.

#### Tips for success:

- Do these exercises *slowly* and listen carefully for the difference in sound between your hands. Be patient! It may take a while to master each step. Learning how to play a warm, full, singing melody with a quieter accompaniment is worth the effort!
- Try giving yourself visual cues in your music. Using Hi-Liter pens or highlighter tape, mark the music with bright pink or red for the loud hand, and cool blue for the guiet hand.
