

December 17, 1770 _____ I was born in Germany and then moved to Austria, where I met Mozart. My first compositions were published when I was age ten. I changed the style of music; I am called a "transitional" composer between the classical and romantic periods of music. I wrote some of the most famous music in the world including "Für Elise," "Moonlight Sonata," and my 5th and 9th Symphonies.

December 30, 1904 ______ I was a Russian composer and conductor. I enjoyed poetry and painting. I played the piano for silent film theaters, and I wrote music for silent films, opera, orchestra, and piano. Perhaps I am most famous for my children's compositions, such as *Clowns* and *Toccatina*. A popular composition of mine is *Comedians' Galop* for orchestra.

January 23, 1752 ______ I was born in Rome, Italy and moved to England. I was a harpsichordist, pianist, and composer of popular sonatinas; if you haven't played one of mine, you likely will soon! I was involved in a famous keyboard "duel" with Mozart. I was also a famous piano manufacturer. I have been called "Father of the Pianoforte" because of my ideas for technique on the revolutionary new high-tech instrument. Our old harpsichords plucked strings instead of hammers striking strings on our new pianos. This takes a different way of playing to sound our best!

January 27, 1756 ______ I was from Austria. I was a composer who began composing at age four. I wrote my first opera at age twelve. I am famous for my operas, symphonies, and piano pieces. My sister and I played the first known duet concerts, and our father took us on concert tours all over Europe to play for royalty. I loved math.

February 8, 1932 _____ When you go to the movies, you might hear my music. I am an American composer of popular film scores, including *Harry Potter, Star Wars, Jaws,* and *ET.* I studied at UCLA and Juilliard School of Music, and I served in the Air Force. I worked as a jazz pianist before beginning my career in the film studios. I was conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra for thirteen years.

February 23, 1685 ______ I was born in Germany in the same year as J.S. Bach. I was an organist and Lutheran just like Bach, but we never met. I worked as a composer in Germany and Italy, and then spent most of my life in England, where I became a British citizen. My most famous compositions are some of the most popular music of all time: *Water Music, Music for the Royal Fireworks,* and the oratorio called *Messiah*.
